I. Only 4 companies run over 80% of the meat production in America.

A. Companies like Tyson, Cargill, Smith Field Foods, & JBS. (According to Bernice Napach and the Daily Ticker)

- 1. The companies find ways to produce products faster, cheaper, and more efficient.
  - a. This leads to mass production of animals and slaughtering.
    - i. Animals are crammed into small confinement systems by thousands.
- 2. Companies put less and less money into the farming of the animals.
- B. We now have Factory Farms according to P.E.T.A.
  - 1. Factory farming is an industrialized production of live stalk
    - a. Most of the livestalk in the U.S. does not roam freely.
      - i. They are confined to save money and space.
- C. These companies have a tight hold on the meat industry.
  - 1. They control most of our livestalk in America.
  - 2. They can produce a monopoly and raise the price of meat and or lower the quality.

Transition: These companies control most of the livestock in America with the lives of billions of cows chickens turkeys pigs and more.

- IV. Chickens and cows in factory farms are neglected and poorly taken care of.
- A. 7 billion chickens are killed each year for their flesh and 99% of these animals spend their lives in total confinement. According to P.E.T.A.
  - Chickens are bred and drugged to grow large quickly that their legs and organs cannot keep up, leading to crippled legs and organ failures. According to P.E.T.A.
    - a. The birds usually never see daylight, for the sheds have no windows.
    - i. Thousands of chickens are crammed into a shed, leaving no room for a bird to extend their wings.
  - b. The ASPCA states, "More than 90% of egg-laying hens in the United States are confined in enclosures called "battery cages" that provide less space, per bird, than a regular 8.5"-by-11" sheet of paper."
    - i. This was banned in the European Union in 1999.
  - 2. Most cows in America's livestalk are kept in factory farms.
    - a. Cows spend most of their lives standing in their own waste in a barren feedlot.
    - If a cow is injured or becomes sick from a harsh diet, it usually does not receive medical attention.
      - ii. The cow is left to suffer because of the mass amount of them.

- B. Cows are fed unnatural grain diets to quickly increase their body weight.
- Many get sick from this unnatural diet causing illness, pain and sometimes death according to the ASPCA.
- Cows used for dairy production usually have 2/3 of their tails cut off without pain killers. This is said to keep the utters cleaner according to the ASPCA.
  - a. Cows are dehorned, either by having them cut off or burned off, and this is generally with no painkillers.
- C. Cows are continually imregnated to produce mass amounts of milk.
- They spend their lives in a constant cycle of impregnantion, birth, and milking all with in a few short months according to FarmSanctuary.org.
- 2. Farmsanctuary.org states "Usually just within hours of birth, calves are taken away from their mothers. Calves can become so distressed from separations that they become sick, lose weight from not eating, and cry so much that their throats become raw."

Transition: The actions of the companies towards the animals can lead unheathy food production and recalls.

- III. Actions lead to E.Coli break outs and many recalls due to the procudures of companies.
- A. The ASPCA states, "Chickens raised for their flesh, called "broilers" by the chicken industry, spend their entire lives in filthy sheds with tens of thousands of other birds, where intense crowding and confinement lead to outbreaks of disease."
  - 1. This leads to break outs of E.coli.
    - a. The break outs creat large recalls that contaminate all of the U.S.

C. Hens are crammed so closely together, they are forced to urinate and defecate on one another according to the ASPCA.

1. This can lead to diseased animals.
