- 6. Why does this group exist? (Massacre of dolphins and inhumane hunting techniques,
  - *FADS)* Okay good, it looks like you tell us here? Be explicit please
    - a. The Cove-- "drive-fishing"
    - i. In Merrit Clifton's article "Fundraising, FADS, "dolphin safe" & why Ric O'Barry left Earth Island Institute", the author goes into detail about the inhumane ways that dolphins are mistreated. "The dolphins are chased into the bay made infamous by the 2010 Academy Award-winning documentary The Cove, and hacked to death en massé mostly to capture a relatively small number of young, healthy dolphins for sale to aquariums" (Clifton).
      - ii. Ric O'Barry states that witnessing this horrifying act just before christmas in 2014 led to many sleepless nights. "It's hell," O'Barry told ANIMALS 24-7. "I haven't slept in three days. I hoped to fly out of here to be home with my family for Christmas, but my relief observer won't get here until the middle of January" (Clifton). #7
        - The dolphins that survive the massacre get sent to animal circuses and are forced to do tricks like jumping through a loop of fire or swimming backgrounds with a basketball in between their flippers as shown on the video released by the dolphin project on their website(2012). What's the source?
          - As shown the video the dolphins are strung up suspended in water until the next show. I'm not sure what this means?
    - b. FADS- Fish aggregating device #4

- i. FADS are devices that attract fish because they appear to provide protection from predators. They are man made and look like random good info, but be sure to tie floating objects, they become homing beacons to tuna and other fish and develop a small eco system. Other fish however, such as sharks and dolphins get caught in this trap, after the fishing boats have pulled out the fish they need the throw sharks and dolphins and unwanted fish back into the water. By that time they have already died of strangulation from being tangled within the nets or from being suffocated by being out of water for hours on end. Shown in the Greenpeace Video(2009) is a perfect representation of how FAD works and how the animals that are unwanted die.
  - ii. Earth Island and "dolphin safe" #20
    - 1. When smaller fish were used for the FAD, fish that both tuna and dolphins prey on, many dolphins got caught in the nets and died, as explained in Merrit Clifton's article. "Surrounding dolphins with purse seines captures tons of tuna per "set," at cost of drowning dozens of dolphin who became entangled in the nets" (Clifton).
